Future Memorials and Spirit of the Land

TarraWarra Museum of Art (TWMA) proudly presents a second unique collaboration with Healesville Sanctuary, its neighbour in the Yarra Valley, to accompany the museum's current feature exhibition Future Memorials

To mark the special occasion of the 10th Anniversary of TarraWarra Museum of Art the museum will be holding a Free Public Open Weekend on the 7th and 8th of December. Entry to the museum's two current feature exhibitions Future Memorials and Russell Drysdale: Defining the Modern Australian Landscape will be free and the museum will also be holding a number of free public programs.

The weekend will also see the visit of a Wedge-tailed Eagle from Healesville Sanctuary, representing Bunjil, the living embodiment of the creator spirit of the Wurundjeri, to celebrate the announcement of a new collaboration between the museum and the world famous native wildlife park.

TWMA and Healesville Sanctuary will introduce a special reduced entry fee* for visitors who visit both venues during the duration of the Future Memorials exhibition. The exhibition takes its cue from the proximity of TWMA to the site of Coranderrk Aboriginal Station which was originally located on almost 5,000 acres along the Yarra River between 1863 and 1924. Future Memorials explores the effects of colonialism on Wurundjeri people and seeks new ways to understand and renew the relationship between the past and the present.

After viewing the Future Memorials exhibition at TWMA, visitors will have the opportunity to make a pilgrimage to Healesville Sanctuary to actually "step onto Coranderrk", as the land at Healesville Sanctuary was originally part of the former Coranderrk Aboriginal Mission Station.

The exhibition at TWMA has been developed by Sydney-based Wiradjuri-Kamilaroi artist Jonathan Jones and Melbourne-based non-Aboriginal artist Tom Nicholson in collaboration with senior Wurundjeri Elder Prof. Aunty Joy Wandin Murphy AO and runs at TarraWarra Museum Art until the 9th of February, 2014.

It presents two new contemporary installation works. Tom Nicholson's Towards a Monument to Batman's Treaty incorporates thousands of bricks and over 100 wall plaques in an exploration of the history of Coranderrk and pioneer John Batman's highly contentious land treaty document which he claimed to have negotiated with the Wurundjeri in 1835. Jonathan Jones yellow light-based work untitled (shield design) is inspired by the diamond

pattern carved on the great Wurundjeri Ngurungaeta (leader) William Barak's historical 1897 parrying shield, on display in the Future Memorials exhibition at TWMA, and his prediction that he would pass when the wattle bloomed.

As a second part of the collaboration the launch of a new TWMA/Healesville Sanctuary combined tour will also be announced on the TWMA 10th anniversary weekend.

Over two Sundays in January next year, visitors will be able to take the *Spirit of the Land* Indigenous walking tour at Healesville Sanctuary after a guided tour of the *Future Memorials* exhibition at TWMA.

Healesville Sanctuary recently unveiled a commemorative bronze life-sized sculpture of William Barak to mark the 110th anniversary of Barak's passing. The sculpture, titled *Between Two Worlds*, depicts a man caught between two worlds, but able to bridge both, as an ambassador for his people and protector of Wurundjeri traditions and culture.

The tour will be led by the present day Wurundjeri Ngurungaeta, Murrindindi, beginning at Barak's statue then following a bushland trail to a *Dreaming Place* for storytelling where a 250 year old canoe tree proudly stands.

Visitors then continue on to another pathway where the story of the former Coranderrk Aboriginal Station continues to unfold. They will experience emotive soundscapes through the voices of elders past and present, the descendants of Barak, who reflect on the inspiring Aboriginal leader and tell their own family stories of Coranderrk passed down through generations.
